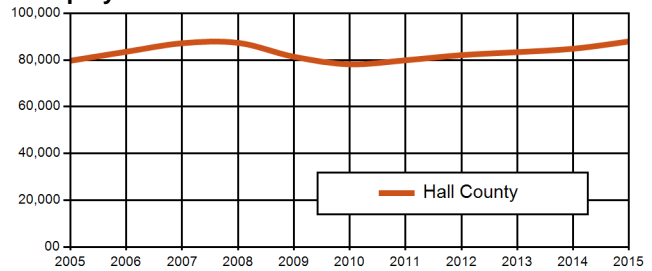

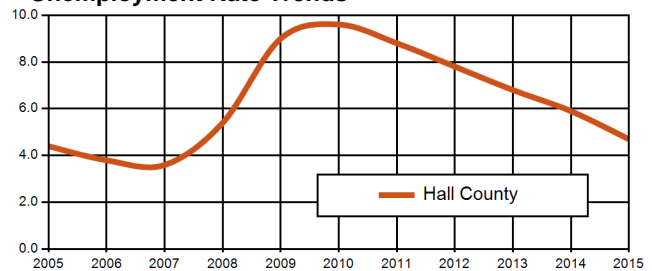

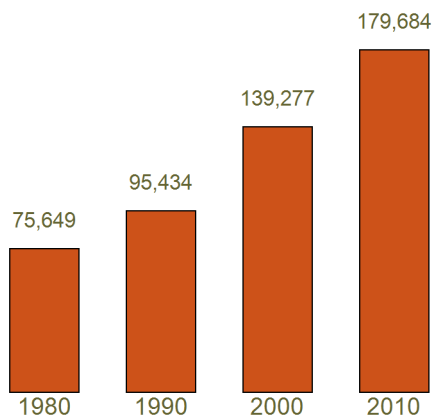
#### Unemployment Rate Trends

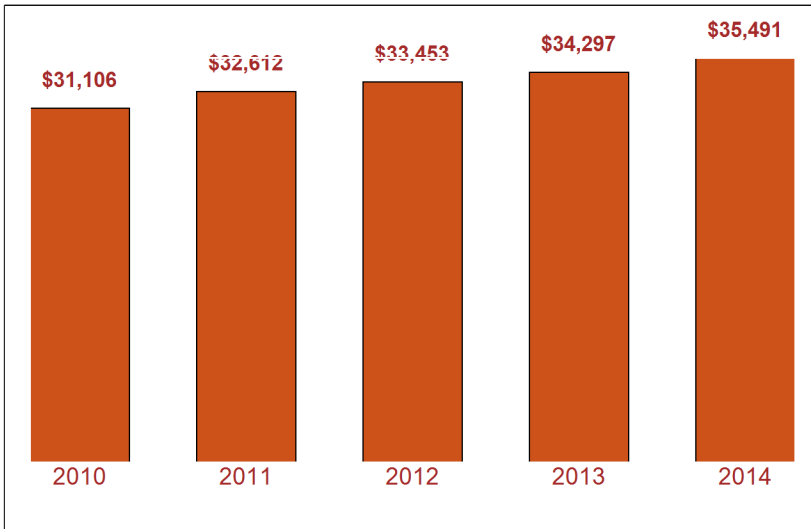

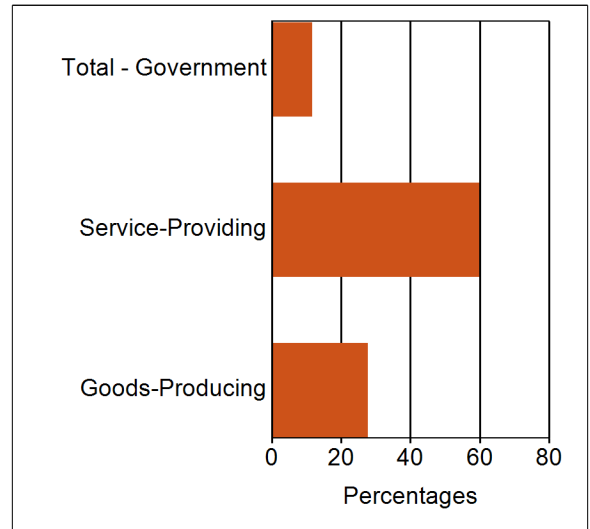
## Hall Per Capita Income
