Developments underway in Oakwood

Oakwood City Manager B.R. White announced the recent approval of over 1.8 million square feet of industrial building and office/warehouse space with projects on West White Road, Falcons Parkway, Chamblee Road and Thurmon Tanner Parkway. Staff is currently working with several groups looking to potentially purchase property and building additional distribution and warehousing space in Oakwood along the 985 corridor. Interactive Neighborhood for Kids (inkfun.org), a hands-on children's museum in Gainesville, will relocate to Oakwood. The relocation is part of Oakwood's 2030 Plan. Other elements of the 2030 plan include a farmers market, small start-up shops, and old-style downtown store fronts. Oakwood 2030 supports the Greater Hall Chamber's

Vision 2030 goals for Hall County to become a "community of towns" with "connectedness among residents, workers and visitors." In addition, Oakwood 2030 falls in line with Vision 2030's promotion of community wellness and protection of green space throughout the county. *cityofoakwood.net*


